

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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Whilst this was our first full year of post-pandemic normality, the operating environment for International Sports Federations has been affected by economic turbulence and uncertainty emanating from the Russia-Ukraine conflict. Though this has impacted WSF's operations in areas such as cost inflation, levels of championship entries and finding a host for this year's WSF AGM, we have finished the year with renewed optimism including a surge in the level of interest to host WSF Championships.

This year's AGM will mark the half-way point in WSF's 2022-25 Strategy. The Board report provides a RAG (red-amber-green) review of progress, with 14% of objectives completed, 67% in various stages of progress and 19% yet to start, with resources the main limitation on speed of progress. This introduction covers some of this year's most notable strategic developments.

One of the strategic objectives for 2022-23, aimed at leveraging WSF's resources and expertise was completing the review of commissions to align with the strategy. The process has included a new Marketing & Commercial Commission; splitting the former Governance & Audit Commission into separate Audit & Risk and Governance & Compliance Commissions; a new Digital Commission; and a revised Championship Commission (including Juniors).

This time last year we had just completed our submission to the LA28 Organising Committee of the Olympic Games for inclusion on the LA Programme, a collaboration across WSF, PSA and US Squash. As one of nine sports for consideration, various delays in the process means we won't know the outcome until just after the AGM papers go out. We remain realistically optimistic.

On the sport front we enjoyed a full calendar of WSF World Championships and the return of a new format World Cup as a 2+2 mixed team event played as best of 5 games to 7 points. The World Cup took place in Chennai thanks to the generous support of the Tamil Nadu Government and the Squash Rackets Federation of India, and generated very positive participant feedback. We would also like to thank the Talaat Moustafa Group and Egyptian Squash Federation for hosting an excellent Women's World Team Championship at Cairo's Madinaty Sports Club in December; and thank Squash Australia and its partners the City of Melbourne and State of Victoria for hosting a very successful World Junior Championships in July.



WSF's Championship new led by Cyrus Commission Poncha has begun an extensive review of WSF Championships structure, formats and regulations. This is an opportunity to modernise our approach, combine men's and women's events where appropriate to enhance their value to players, hosts, sponsors, media and broadcast. There is also a new impetus behind the junior and masters world ranking projects first initiated prior to the pandemic.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Two years after it's soft launch, the World Squash Officiating (WSO) project has moved into its next phase of evolution with the appointment of four specific postholders to accelerate its growth and reach. Enhancements include the new referee appraisal process, the provision of bespoke training packages for nations and the roll-out of the player education module. Meanwhile, a new WSO Steering Group will guide its governance and strategic development.

Launched 16 months ago, WSF's free-to-view worldsquash.tv has gained significant momentum, with the World Junior Championships exceeding 100,000 views and boosting subscriber numbers to now exceed 13,000. We have also witnessed a remarkable growth in WSF's social media reach over the last year and look forward to seeing further growth during 2024.

Three areas of growing importance to international federations and the IOC are i) WADA compliance; ii) environmental sustainability; and iii) player welfare and safeguarding. Though starting from different points, WSF has progressed each of these over the last year. Regarding WADA compliance, WSF has successfully completed WADA's extensive Code of Compliance Questionnaire with only one minor corrective measure. Our partner International Testing Authority has confirmed this as a remarkable achievement, and I'd like to use this opportunity to thank the Medical Commission and the WSF office for their commitment to complete this significant exercise so efficiently. The (Environmental) Sustainability Task Group has over its initial 6 months produced a draft strategy, to be shared with the AGM; and we have set up an initial Safeguarding Panel, though still searching for one or two additional panel members with expertise in this important task.

All this activity sits alongside the on-going critical work of our other commissions: Coaching, Masters, Squash57, Courts & Equipment, Rules, Medical, Disciplinary, Ethics and Athletes. The extent of WSF's Commissions reflects our huge reliance on our committed expert volunteers working alongside our small hard-working team of three paid staff. Collectively they deliver huge value to our squash community, not necessarily captured in our financial turnover.

The last year has emphasised the importance of our partnership with the PSA, demonstrating that we are stronger together when we combine our relative expertise and knowledge to enhance our sport at all levels and continue our ambition to make squash one of the most entertaining sports in the world.



On behalf of the WSF and its Board, a sincere thank you to everyone who has contributed to WSF's activities over the last year, whether volunteers, staff, partners or other supporters. I'd also like to thank the WSF office, a small but dedicated team who hold everything together. This report covers your collective achievements and contributions, which hugely we appreciate.

I am pleased to present this report to the 2023 AGM and to respond to any questions.

Financial Report 2022-2023

Operations

The overall operational deficit of £18,179 is principally due to the following combination of factors; i) prudent budgeting during the year led to an operating profit of £26,501, ii) the WSO platform taking longer than forecasted to generate the anticipated level of feepaying registrations, therefore necessitating the need to write off the remaining value of the asset (£44,680) iii) a significant increase in the cost of anti-doping services via the International Testing Authority (ITA) due an unforeseen anti-doping investigation and rising exchange costs.

The WSF has reserves of £10,000 in its liquidity account.

Membership Fees

The WSF's invoice from membership fees closed at \pounds 148,943 for the year, the slight increase due to the addition of one associate members who has applied for full two vote membership and one member settling outstanding fees and being invoiced for 2023 membership.

Grants

The International Olympic Committee contributes a Programme Development Grant of \$32,000, as part of its support for IOC Recognised International Federations. One third must be used in support of the WSF's Anti-Doping programme, the remainder used as match-funding for squash development. The WSF is grateful to receive all such support

SPIN Registration

Squash Personal Identification Number (SPIN) Registration total income was \pounds 30,851. There was a significant increase in new registrations this financial year coinciding with entries for World Junior Championships, Asian Games and new Coaches registering.

There was £44,375 rights fee and levy income during the year, 50% up on budget due to the addition of one brand new event during this financial year.

Salaries

The salary line was adjusted in October 2022 as a result of moving the CEO consultancy fee line to form part of the salaries under French payroll.

Consultancy Fees

This category was created to include consultants such as William Louis-Marie (CEO), as initially he was not classed as salaried as a non-UK resident. On the advice of the auditor and employment consultants the CEO contract became salaried (French payroll) from October 2022.

Establishment Costs

Establishment costs, which includes rent, rates, light, heat, telephones and insurance totalled $\pounds 16,428$, the underspend due to electricity charge rises not increasing in January as anticipated but came into effect in July 2023.

Administrative Overheads

Administrative overheads totalled £256,047 which now includes all items except employment costs, establishment costs, bank charges and depreciation. This is due to the change of auditor and the preparation in the accounts.

WSF Commission Expenditure

WSF Commission expenditure was £38751.63; an increase in spending from last year due to more coaching courses being laid on with the lifting of travel restrictions and the VAT review being undertaken by Azets at the request of the Audit and Risk Commission.

Professional Fees

Professional fees of \pounds 22,731 includes audit, accountancy, legal and corporate management. The outturn is below budget due to the delay in transferring to the new UK company saving legal costs of re-issuing WSF's trading contracts.

Financial Control

WSF finances are handled from the Office, using XERO software. An external bookkeeper was engaged from August 2021 to reconcile the monthly accounts. Monthly management reports are produced for Board review to ensure overall control and performance against budget. The Audit & Risk Commission also review the monthly management reports. Azets, the WSF's accountants, provided financial advice and payroll services during the period. New auditors Beever & Struthers were engaged in May 2023 and carried out the Federation's 2022/23 annual audit.

Period of the Report

This report covers the period between the 2022 and 2023 Annual General Meetings. However, due to publication timings, the report only includes information since the last report up to 31 August 2023 The WSF's financial year is 1 July to 30 June and the membership year is 1 January to 31 December.

Administration

World Squash Federation Limited continues to trade as a limited liability company in the Isle of Man (Company Number 079771C) following its incorporation on 1 July 1996.

Registrations. There was one new and one re-elected Officer elected at the 2022 Annual General Meeting registered via Dixcart, the WSF's Isle of Man Management Company. Dixcart was provided with copies of the Annual General Meeting minutes and the audited accounts for their records. The WSF was incorporated in the UK on 14 July 2022 and the change in director was filed with the UK Companies House. The WSF did not trade in the UK during the 2022/23 financial year, due to delays in obtaining banking facilities.

Data Protection. The General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) came into effect on 25 May 2018, defining how organisations must collect, handle and store personal information. These rules apply regardless of whether data is stored electronically, on paper or on other materials. To comply with the law, personal information must be collected and used fairly, stored safely and not disclosed unlawfully. The WSF maintains Data Protection, Data Breach, Lawful Basis for Processing Data, and Website and Cookie policies along with website Terms of Reference.

Everyone who works for or with WSF has some responsibility for ensuring data is collected, stored and handled appropriately. Each group or individual that handles or processes personal data must ensure it fully complies with this policy and data protection principles.


Executive Board Activities

Meetings: The Board held monthly e-Meetings, with additional meetings to address specific topics or urgent matters. Priorities: The Board's work and priorities have been largely driven by a) the 2022-25 WSF Strategy presented as part of the 2021 AGM agenda; and b) circumstances arising during the year which required timely Board actions.

In addition to the Board's standard business activities such as monitoring finances, ensuring good governance, etc., the following are some of the key activities of the Board:


- Maintained the stability of the WSF in conjunction with Continents and Nations, providing support and ensuring a robust and sustainable staff structure
- Creation of an implementation plan to determine actions and priorities for the WSF strategy and monitor progress (owned by the CEO, monitored by the Board)
- Completed the Commission structure and composition review to ensure alignment with the WSF strategy.
- Monitored the process for the relocation of the company registration from Isle of Man to UK
- · Advised on the continuing discussions with PSA on the WSF-PSA partnership
- Addressed various questions and challenges associated with the hosting of Championships.
- Oversaw the reinstatement of the World Cup, with a new team format in June 2023.
- Actively seeking hosts for the World Under 23 Championships.
- Consideration of how to best support the continuation of squash in existing multi-sport games and gaining entry into others.
- WSF Board and Office presence at all WSF World Championships in the period.
- Continue to monitor the decision made in conjunction with PSA, Athletes' Commission and European Squash Federation regarding Russian and Belarusian teams and players taking part in WSF and PSA events following the conflict with Ukraine.
- Met formally with the Executive Committee and informally with Continental Presidents to address items of mutual interest
- Monitored progress of the World Squash Officiating project in its second year of operation and considered solutions to challenges, modifying the agreement with PSA to cap costs for the WSF until end of June 2024.
- Continue to partnership with Squash Levels to create the first world ratings system for squash
- Monitoring of the WSF risk register and actions required to mitigate risk
- Consideration of a major review of SPIN, to be carried forward into 2023
- Consideration of the review of WSF voting structure (following up the 2018-19 review)
- Consideration of the re-activation of Friends of World Squash

WSF Board Report 2022/2023 Commission Structure

Structure: The structure of WSF Commissions has been reviewed to fully align with the Strategic Plan. Different working groups have also been established to address specific issues under a strict timescale.

Operational Outline for Commissions:

Each Commission Chair (normally a specialist in the field) reports to the Board via the Board appointed liaison on the Commission (the WSF President, a Vice President or the CEO) and the WSF Office. Commission members are proposed by the Chair, Continental Federations and/or the WSF Office for review by the Board. Chairs are required to submit reports to the Board twice a year as a minimum. **Selection of Chairs & Members:** The WSF will ask Member Nations to submit nominations for new members based on the particular capabilities and expertise specified in each commission's terms of reference. Commission membership will be reviewed every two years.

Commission Activity

Anti-Doping

(Continued)

WSF's Anti-Doping Commission was disbanded in 2020 and the ITA now undertakes all aspects of anti-doping. Dr Anne Smith, Chair of Medical Commission is the WSF liaison with ITA.

The following is the summary report for 2022 produced for WSF by ITA:

The International Testing Agency (ITA) has implemented a comprehensive intelligence-led and risk-based testing program on behalf of the WSF throughout 2022. The ITA coordinated 42 out-of-competition (OOC) test attempts, collecting 33 urine and 14 blood passport samples between January – December 2022. The distribution of out-of-competition testing was based on the WSF risk assessment with a primary focus on the high-risk periods for doping in the build-up to the 2022 PSA World Championships (43% of all OCC). The ITA also coordinated with the relevant NADOs to ensure that international-level squash players were tested during all relevant risk periods.

Of the 42 OOC test attempts, 9 resulted in an unsuccessful attempt; accounting for 21% of the WSF's OOC testing program. This unsuccessful attempt rate is similar to 2021 and is still slightly higher than other international federations which have delegated their testing program to the ITA. Whilst the unsuccessful attempt rate may be higher than other International Federations delegated to the ITA, this is mainly due to lower out-of-competition test numbers under World Squash's testing authority. The ITA will monitor the unsuccessful attempt rate in 2023 and continue to educate and support athletes regarding the importance of submitting and regularly updating whereabouts information to enable no advance notice testing to reduce the unsuccessful attempt rate.

The ITA coordinated testing at 14 international squash events in 7 different countries. 87 urine samples and 3 blood samples were collected in competition in 2022 representing a significant increase from 2021 (a 118% increase compared to 2021). The number of in-competition tests conducted in 2022 was the highest number on record, with 25 additional tests conducted, compared to the next highest year in 2017.

Commission Activity

Anti-Doping (Continued)

During 2022, the ITA has continued to develop initiatives to improve the quality of WSF's anti-doping program by analysing testing history data for international-level squash players competing in the PSA World Tour. This has enabled the ITA to monitor international squash players testing histories on a systematic basis to identify athletes with limited testing history in the previous months or athletes who have previously never been tested and initiate out-of-competition and in-competition testing accordingly. The data analysis tools have also provided the ITA with a clear overview of the testing conducted by the NADOs and ensures that our testing plans continue to be well coordinated.

In 2021, the ITA identified a potential gap in testing elite international level squash players, with 22% of the top 20 players in the PSA world rankings not being tested. With increased testing resources from the PSA for WSF's in-competition testing program, and further collaboration with NADOs and the development of data analysis tools, the ITA has significantly reduced the testing gap to 7.5% in 2022. The ITA will continue to monitor testing conducted worldwide on international-level squash players to minimise this gap further and ensure WSF implements a rigorous and intelligence-led testing program in 2023.

Whilst there have been successes in reducing the overall gap in 2022, there is still a significant gap in out-of-competition testing, with 37.5% of the top 20 Squash players not being tested in 2022. According to the ITA review, 45% of the top 20 squash players come from countries with a less established NADO, and therefore, have limited resources available to implement an effective out-of-competition testing strategy on all elite-level squash players competing for their country. Combined with WSF's approach of only including two athletes per gender/nationality in World Squash's testing pool, this has exacerbated the out-of-competition gap and may impact the overall effectiveness of WSF's testing program. In 2023, the ITA will conduct a more in-depth review and make recommendations to improve WSF's out-of-competition testing program.

Athletes

The Athletes' Commission, which is managed in partnership with the PSA, is jointly chaired by Sarah-Jane Perry and Saurav Ghosal. The Commission has been consulted on various questions including the inclusion of Russian athletes, athlete representation on other sporting bodies, transgender inclusion etc. The AC Chairs are members of the WSF Executive Committee.

Commission Activity

Composition. Tom Oldroyd has been in the position of Chair since January 2019. In 2022/2023 the C&E Commission has had a number of changes of members of the Commission. The C&EC has actively recruited new members who bring specific knowledge and expertise to the Commission.

Technical Queries. The Squash Court Specifications are published on the WSF website and are also included within many National Federation's sites. Technical enquiries usually originate from the website and almost without exception are processed by email, occasionally by further phone calls. Every enquiry received during the year was satisfactorily dealt with by directing the enquirer to an electronic version of the Court Specifications or by referring more complex issues to the Commission Chair.

Specific topics covered during the period included: technical queries from National Federations and individuals; construction details of new flooring, wall panels; new glazed court glass, structural stability and transparency specifications and standards; fixing details and make up of wall panels; new door hinges and door closing mechanism hardware manufacture; specification of court markings; assessing new protecting eyewear and looking at consolidating standards from different regions; continuing the testing of squash57 balls to ensure that the WSF standards are up to date. Enquiries originated from all geographic regions including Finland, Poland, Japan, India, China, Australia, Denmark, Russia, France, US and the UK.

The Court Specifications. The current court specifications remain unchanged.

Portable court innovation has continued to progress this year with the fabrication of several Perspex courts. These courts were successfully utilised in the public entrance area in the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games and other highprofile tournaments.

WSF has been liaising with various WSF accredited companies including some padel companies to develop an affordable and robust external squash court. WSF is also liaising with PSA to ensure that a coordinated strategy is progressing as this is an important arena of innovation. WSF C&CE has been involved in the outdoor squash committee monthly forum, which is a regular get together of international enthusiasts.

WSF has been liaising with a qualified structural engineer to look at how best to develop outdoor squash internationally.

WSF has been liaising with Padel tennis' governing body to discuss parallels with developing outdoor squash.

WSF has been liaising with 'floating padel court' company in Finland to develop the possibility of a floating outdoor squash court.

Disciplinary

Cases. The Disciplinary Commission was required to deal with a number of matters in the last year. Disappointingly both of the World Junior events involved multiple referrals. There were 10 referrals from the World Junior Championships in France in August 2022 and 17 referrals from the World Junior Championships in Australia in July 2023. While most referrals did not involve significant incidents, the level of referral is unacceptable a greater level of discipline is required.

There was one referral from the Commonwealth Games and one from the World Games.

One decision was appealed, and a Tribunal appointed to deal with this.

The Integrated Disciplinary Procedure was not utilised during the period.

- It was not necessary to update the WSF Code of Conduct during the period
- Mutual Recognition of Penalties via an Integrated Disciplinary Panel in conjunction with PSA and Continental Federations required no refinement

The Ethics Commission The Ethics Commission received one complaint during the past year. It was a case which the Chair determined required an investigation following Article 11 of Appendix 7 to the Code of Ethics.

Accordingly, a suitably qualified investigator was found and undertook the brief. She completed her report for consideration by the Commission. The Commission decided that it was a case that could be dealt with pursuant to Article 24 of Appendix 7 to the Code of Ethics and made its recommendations for the Executive Board to consider.

Rules

Membership and Structure. During 2022-23 the WSF Rules Commission membership comprised: Chair - Michael Collins; Members -Lee Drew, Srikanth Seshadri and Leonardo Arozena.

Activity during the period. No physical meetings of the members were possible and so all communications and discussions took place via email and zoom meetings.

- The Commission received a request from the WSF Executive Board to consider a comprehensive and detailed submission proposing changes to the Singles Rules in order to create more consistency in terminology and grammar throughout the rules.
- The Commission further received a request from the PSA to change certain official calls in the Singles Rules.
- The Commission received various submissions and proposals throughout the period from member nations and individuals proposing improvements and changes to the current rules.
- The Commission has accordingly been active collating all of the abovementioned submissions and proposals and workshopping these to determine which are relevant and appropriate to incorporate into the Rules.
- The Commission intends to complete this work and prepare its own submission to the WSF Executive Board for consideration at the next AGM.
- If the WSF Board is supportive of the submission the Commission will prepare the formal Resolution and Motivation for inclusion in the AGM documents.

As the WSF website "Frequently Asked Questions" was discontinued the Chair continues to respond to individual rules interpretation queries forwarded to him by the WSF office. The Commission received numerous rules related queries during the year from many of the squash playing countries which were resolved and clarified. The Chair frequently assists squash publications with general queries and the formulation of rules related quiz questions and answers.

Squash57

Marketing/Promoting Squash57: the WSF has relied on the Squash57 Commission promoting Squash57 through limited social media channels. Squash57 could/should be being played in all squash playing nations. If Squash57 is to become more strategic and key to the WSF's inclusivity 'campaign' then it requires and deserves a greater level of (professional) resourcing. In the meantime, we will push ahead at our volunteering pace

Inclusivity: in 2021 the WSF initiated a Diversity/Inclusivity initiative alongside England Squash. Partially as a consequence, ES have their 'Inclusion and Diversity' initiative and the WSF, with the recommendations from former World #1 paralympic tennis player Robin Ammerlaan, have developed rules for Wheelchair Squash57. Over the last year Squash57 Commission's Lolly Gillen, with the full support of Squash Canada, has been running a successful Wheelchair Squash57 program in Ontario offering both singles and doubles play by combining wheelchair athletes with able bodied players. Rules have again been modified to accommodate different degrees of mobility. Wheelchair Squash57 programs are now being expanded in Ontario and BC. Wheelchair players are participating in either a sport wheelchair or their own personal day chair depending on their ability to transfer.

Commission Activity

World Squash Officiating W.S.O

WSO Project. WSF and PSA have reached an agreement to amend WSO, and this includes signing a temporary variation to the original MoU. According to this addendum, PSA will take full financial responsibility for the Project from January 1, 2023, until June 30, 2024. During this period, WSF will make financial contributions of £1,000 per month from January 2023 to June 2023 and £2,250 per month from July 2023 to June 2024. After June 2024, both parties will make efforts to agree on a new funding structure. If no mutual agreement is reached at least one month before the end of the period, the funding arrangements will revert to the original agreement. The financial agreement replaces the consultancy fee previously committed by WSF to Roy Gingell, who is now employed full-time as a WSO Professional Referee and Development Lead.

WSO Structure. A new governance structure has been implemented within the WSO, emphasising the inclusion of the Head of WSO position and the constitution of the Steering Group. The new governance framework aims to enhance organisational efficiency, accountability, and strategic decision-making. Lee Drew has been appointed as the Head of WSO, owing to his contributions to the project thus far. He will directly report to the Steering Group, which currently consists of William Louis-Marie, Alex Gough, and one other member (currently under active recruitment).

Advisory Group. WSO is re-evaluating its inactive 'Advisory Board' and plans to rename it as the 'Advisory Group.' Once established, the group will actively support the WSO Team in delivering strategic objectives, aiding in the ongoing development of materials and documentation. Additionally, the group will play a crucial role in communication through continental/national federations, supporting WSO's adoption as the central platform for worldwide squash officiating and assisting up-and-coming referees' pathway through the WSO structure. These efforts are aimed at continuous improvement and successful project delivery. Unfortunately, Jim Hay, the appointed Chair of the Advisory Board, has been unable to fulfil this role due to personal reasons.

Commission Activity

World Squash Officiating W.S.O

Referee Appointments. WSO has continued to manage the appointment process for all WSF and PSA World Tour events. This requires a significant amount of work involving checking availability, negotiating refereeing budgets, and arranging logistics.

PSA Relationship. We have continued to work closely with the PSA to develop collaboration on all refereeing issues, especially within the WSO project.

General support. WSO has consistently provided support for all WSF events, focusing particularly on all aspects of refereeing, including the Women's World Teams and World Junior Individuals/Teams. Furthermore, ongoing communication with numerous Continental and National Federations regarding the migration to the WSO website is actively in progress.
